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President and Vice President's Report

ACHPER NSW has had a productive year during a dynamic period in the PDHPE Key Learning Area. 2018 saw ACHPER NSW lead over 1670 primary and secondary educators through our workshops and conferences as well as supporting over 155 HSC students during our HSC Enrichment Days.

2018 saw significant energy invested in supporting the implementation of the new K-10 PDHPE Syllabus from 2019. ACHPER engaged in a range of partnerships to support the implementation of the new syllabus, most prominently with the Department of Education to deliver Syllabus familiarisation and programming workshops that were attended by 720 teachers. A further partnership with Janice Atkin has seen ACHPER NSW roll out workshops supporting teachers with effective assessment practices for the new syllabus that will continue into 2019.

ACHPER NSW continues to value, and strives to develop strong relationships with key stakeholders. ACHPER NSW continues to liaise with and support the work of NESA in the development and implementation of new syllabus documents. 2018 saw the consultation around the Draft Directions for Stage 6 PDHPE which ACHPER NSW reported back to NESA on behalf of its member. ACHPER NSW is also currently part of the NESA Board Curriculum Committee to represent our members through the consultation and implementation process for the new Stage 6 PDHPE Syllabus. In 2018 there was also consultation for the draft elective syllabus documents for Physical Activity and Sport Studies and Child Studies. ACHPER NSW values the opportunity to be involved in these processes and be a voice for our members.

ACHPER NSW also maintains strong relationships with ACHPER National, the Department of Education, Catholic Education Offices around NSW, Association of Independent Schools of NSW, NSW Health and the School Sport Unit.

ACHPER NSW would like to extend our thanks and congratulations to the writers, presenters, mentors and reviewers of ACHPER NSW workshops, conference materials and other resources offered in 2018. It is your work that continues to make such a big difference to the teachers and students across NSW.

ACHPER NSW Board

2018 saw a number of changes to the ACHPER NSW Board with long standing Board member and President Kelly Bell stepping down as President. Kelly took on the role of President during 2016 after many years serving as a Board Member in a range of positions. Executive Officer's Report

Executive Officer's Message

It is with sadness that I submit my final Executive Officer's report for ACHPER NSW. I am retiring in April 2019. My heartfelt thanks to the Board members, office staff and supporters who have assisted both myself and ACHPER NSW to build a strong reputation as a key provider of professional learning programs for K-12 PDHPE teachers in government, catholic and independent schools.

Membership

The membership for ACHPER NSW has again fallen during 2018. Many other ACHPER branches are experiencing the same trends. ACHPER National is looking into the current membership categories and the reimbursement system for the State and National as a priority for 2019.

Constitution

Following after ACHPER National updated the constitution late in 2017, ACHPER NSW contracted Associations Forum to update our current constitution during 2018. The constitution had not been updated since 2013. The draft constitution will be submitted to members at the 2019 AGM.

Staff

Karen Burton came to work for ACHPER NSW in May 2018 four days a week. She has demonstrated her efficiency and attention to detail at the Stage 6 Conference. During semester 2 she coordinated the K-10 PDHPE Programming and Effective Assessment workshops.

Emma Chapman had notified ACHPER NSW that she intended to resign from ACHPER NSW in April 2018 due to moving to Adelaide. Circumstances changed and Emma has returned to the office in Semester 2 on a casual basis.

Tracy Puckeridge continues to exhibit what a valuable asset she is to the organisation. She produces a high volume of work while maintaining high standards for quality and accuracy.

The Board has decided to conduct an external review of both the office positions and Board positions. This will take place during Term 1, 2019 by Associations Forum.



Workshops

In 2018 ACHPER NSW focused on offering workshops around the new K-10 PDHPE Syllabus. In Term 1 and 2 we assisted the Department of Education - PDHPE Curriculum in managing the Unpacking the K-10 PDHPE Syllabus Workshops.

ACHPER NSW then contracted **Janice Atkin** to write and deliver Programming the K-10 PDHPE Syllabus workshops in Term 3 both in Sydney and regional NSW. Janice presented at 13 workshops in Term 3. A high interest level for these workshops required us to offer more Programming Workshops in Term 4 to cater for the overflow.

We also offered Phase 3 workshops on Effective Assessment in K-10 PDHPE Syllabus workshops. Janice has now been contracted to train interested PDHPE teachers from both primary and high schools to present at both the Programming and Assessment workshops in 2019.

Our Stage 6 Conference in May, 2018 was extremely successful. We continued to support Stage 6 PDHPE and CAFS teachers throughout the year with single day workshops.

ACHPER NSW was again contracted by NSW Health to provide K-6 Physical Activity and Health Conferences in regional and metropolitan locations in 2018. We provided conferences in Newcastle, Albury and Sydney South West in 2018.

Stage 6 PDHPE Report 2018

The Stage 6 portfolio continues to be integral in professionally developing workshops catering for the needs of teachers of Stage 6 PDHPE and Community and Family Studies.

The workshops, for both PDHPE and Community and Family Studies, continue to have workshop materials refined and updated. This main focus of the workshops has been to provide practical applications for the participants so that the participants leave with relevant resources that can be applied to their school context. The development of webinars has also meant that access to information for PDHPE teachers across NSW can occur throughout the entire year based on members needs.

The main focus of Stage 6 PDHPE has been centred around the following workshops:

- Teaching Stage 6 PDHPE for the first time
- Improving student performance in PDHPE
- PDHPE HSC Marking Simulations
- PDHPE enrichment days
- PDHPE Quality Assessment
- Teaching Stage 6 CAFS for the First time
- CAFS Quality Assessment
- CAFS Marking Simulation Workshops
- CAFS HSC Enrichment Days
- Reigniting the Spark in CAFS
- Thriving in CAFS
- Stage 6 Dance Workshop

Professional learning opportunities were provided in all areas of NSW, rural and metropolitan, including a new workshop that was developed, the "Stage 6 Dance Workshop." This workshop successfully assisted participants gained an insight into developing quality assessment practices and make effective judgements about student learning in Stage 6 Dance.



As seen in the past couple of years the Sydney workshops tend to be the most popular, continuing to have adequate numbers to commit to running these workshops at these venues.

To assist in meeting a Strategic Priority to support Rural and Remote areas of NSW, the application of participant feedback to conduct two Stage 6 workshops back to back has been implemented, to facilitate the needs of participants who travel.

In summary, 2018 was another successful year for ACHPER NSW in delivering Professional Development for Stage 6 teachers. Our full suite of workshops will be offered again 2019,

The Annual Stage 6 Conference was held May 25 and 26 at Bankstown Sports Club where PDHPE teachers from across NSW were in attendance. The conference again covered workshops from three strands, PDHPE, CAFS and Generic. Feedback from the conference from delegates indicated the workshops that were presented were highly valuable and experiences provided many resources for teachers to apply in the classroom. K-10 Portfolio Report 2018

This report outlines the workshops that were organised by ACHPER NSW in 2018 for the K-10 PDHPE Portfolio. With the introduction of the new K-10 PDHPE Syllabus, ACHPER NSW decided that there was a need to focus on developing and delivering workshops on this in 2018.

A partnership between ACHPER NSW and the Department of Education led to the development and creation of a one day workshop aimed at unpacking the syllabus for teachers. The Unpacking of the PDHPE K-10 Syllabus Workshop provided participants with a deep knowledge and understanding of the features of the new PDHPE K-10 Syllabus. It also provided participants with the skills and opportunity to critique their current practice and plan for action in programming for the new syllabus.



This year also saw the inaugural 7-10 PDHPE Symposium in March which was held at Kiama. The symposium was ideal as the venue had a large auditorium, smaller seminar rooms and an oval for practical seminars. The delegates commented that the seminars on assessment, the introduction to the K-10 Syllabus and how best to teach mental health, supported their professional learning. The feedback was positive for the practical seminars for Games Sense and Dance, and so ACHPER NSW look to develop similar practical-based workshops in the future. In moving forward, ACHPER NSW has proposed that in light of the focus on the implementation of the K-10 PDHPE Syllabus in 2018 -2019, we are looking to holding the 7-10 PDHPE Symposium in 2020, with the possibility of combining it with the current ACHPER NSW Stage 6 Conference.

Next year, this portfolio is exploring ways in which to develop partnerships with K-6 teachers, so that we can support them with the implementation of the new K-6 PDHPE Syllabus in 2020. ACHPER NSW welcomes ideas on how else we can support K-10 PDHPE teachers in the future.

Capacity Building and Innovation

This portfolio is responsible for ongoing capacity building across our profession and aims to support teachers and leaders in PDHPE.

This year ACHPER NSW has grown its presence on Facebook and Twitter with over 4500 followers on these platforms. Further to this, ACHPER NSW has continued its collaboration with the NSW PDHPE facebook page which has a viewing platform of 3500 teachers in NSW. ACHPER also continues to facilitate the shared Google Drive for PDHPE teachers in NSW which was initiated in 2017 in conjunction with the NSW PDHPE Teachers facebook page. The ACHPER NSW webpage has also seen an increase in viewing access and new visitors to the webpage.

New Workshop: Embedding Technology into the New K-10 Syllabus

The new K-10 Syllabus provided an opportunity for PDHPE educators to review their pedagogy to ensure teaching, learning and assessment is underpinned by the 5 propositions and in particular, that their use of technology is purposeful to develop student's knowledge, understanding and skills.

ACHPER facilitated a one-day practical workshop which was designed to support teachers embedding the G Suite (previously known as Google Apps) into their teaching and learning of both theory and practical content.

Workshop participants were introduced to the key applications in the suite, see examples of how to best utilise the applications to support a critical inquiry and strengths-based approach, health literacy, and valuing movement; and given time to explore and create.

Google applications explored during the workshop will include:

- Google Drive the "flash drive in the sky"
- Google Chrome extensions and apps
- Google Docs Collaborative processes
- Google Slides Use and application
- Google Classroom 21st Century Learning

This portfolio is exploring a range of exciting new initiatives that aim to provide our very best professional development through latest technology applications. Harnessing these alternative methods has significant potential benefits and ACHPER NSW is keen to make the most of these new opportunities.

Community Engagement Portfolio

This portfolio is responsible for staying abreast of current research, policies and documents pertaining to PDHPE, liaising with the ACHPER NSW Board and proving feedback to stakeholders that represents the Board's position. The portfolio also works on building engagement and fostering relationships with all of our stakeholders, including schools, post-school pathways, early childhood, sporting bodies and not-for-profit organisations.

This year, current research and resources to support the implementation of the new PDHPE K-10 syllabus have been shared and articles supporting teaching and learning for Stage 6 PDHPE and CAFS have been shared with our stakeholders via our social media platforms, ACHPER NSW Facebook page and Twitter. Our presence has grown, with over 3000 followers on these platforms.

ACHPER NSW has provided members the opportunity to engage in the Stage 6 PDHPE syllabus development consultation processes, providing a written response to the NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA), following a survey of members. ACHPER NSW Board Executive also represented members at a key stakeholder meeting to ensure ACHPER members views were shared and questions posed regarding the Draft Directions for syllabus development.

ACHPER NSW will continue to build strong partnerships with stakeholders in 2019 with an emphasis on building relations with post-school pathways.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER, 2018

1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act NSW. The Committee has determined that the Association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act NSW and the following Australian Accounting Standards:

AASB 1031 Materiality

AASB 110 Events After The Balance Sheet Date

No other applicable Accounting Standards, Urgent Issues Group Consensus Views or other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board have been applied.

This financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non current assets.

The following material accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

a) Fixed Assets

Office equipment is carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets are depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the Association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

b) Employee Entitlements

Provision has been made for possible long service leave of employees, which can be taken after ten years of service. Employees are entitled to their accrued long service leave after five years. All employees with over five years service have been included.

c) Income Tax

In recent years, the Australian Taxation Office has left the question of whether an association is tax exempt up to the committee to determine. In 2017 the Australian Taxation Office has undertaken an additional step of reviewing association records to see if the association does in fact match the Australian Taxation Office's strict guidelines.

Such a review was undertaken for ACHPER NSW Branch Inc in June 2017 and the Australian Taxation Office has confirmed the opinions held by the Committee that the Association is tax exempt.

These procedures have been undertaken to form an opinion whether, in all material respects, the financial report is presented fairly in accordance with the accounting policies described in Note 1 so as to present a view which is consistent with our understanding of the Association's financial position, and performance as represented by the results of its operations and its cash flows. These policies do not require the application of all Accounting Standards and other mandatory professional reporting requirement in Australia.

The audit opinion expressed in this report has been formed on the above basis.
